**Year C, Palm Sunday,
April 10, 2022**

*Psalm 118:1-2, 19-29;
Luke 19:28-40*

When Jesus came to Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover because of his growing fame crowds jammed the streets to

herald him King of the Jews. They believed Jesus would deliver them from the oppression of Roman rule and re-establish the Kingdom of David. As Jesus processed, the crowds waved palms and cried out, "*Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!*"

Just before death, a person often becomes more alert and engaging with family and friends. This rallying, which is short lived, sometimes creates a false sense of hope to an already grieving family that their loved one will recover. But, inevitably, this "blossoming" ends in a manner of days. Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem was for him, a last "blossoming."

Today, we join generations who have read this account and know death awaits Jesus, in just a few days. If we are honest, we may feel some sadness knowing Good Friday is coming. But, we believers, "*do not grieve as others who have no hope,*" as Paul reminds us in 1Thessalonians 4:13. Our hope rests on the certainty and *lived experience* that the kingdom Jesus came to establish resides in our hearts. For Jesus, God's kingdom was worth dying and rising from the grave for, to freely give it to us because every day, Easter comes.
